We have been preparing for this launch with the support of our partners at Alameda County Behavioral Health and have created a website to share up to date information about 988 and to provide linkage to other crisis services in our county. Please note that you can still contact various crisis resources directly and 988 is not meant to add a barrier for providers or consumers.

What to expect when you contact 988:

We'll play you a little music while we connect you to a trained crisis line counselor. The location of the counselor is based on the area code of your phone. The crisis line counselor will provide emotional support, safety assessment, safety planning, and referrals to appropriate and available resources. Keep reading.

Xylazine Basics: Overdose Prevention, Harm Reduction, and Wound Care

This document provides information on xylazine, a non-opioid veterinary tranquilizer used as an additive in illicit drug supplies, notably in combination with heroin and fentanyl. It discusses the effects of xylazine use, including sedation and potential risks such as hypotension and bradycardia. The document also emphasizes harm reduction interventions for individuals who may encounter xylazine in the drug supply, including the use of naloxone for responding to overdoses and the importance of wound identification and treatment.

Responding to Overdose in Communities Where Xylazine Is Present • As xylazine is often mixed with opioid drugs like heroin and fentanyl, people using those substances have the potential to experience both opioid overdose and prolonged and/or severe sedation due to the presence of xylazine.

• Xylazine does not respond to naloxone, so a person who used an opioid and xylazine may remain sedated even after administration of naloxone. It is important to assess respiratory status and look for the return of breathing after naloxone administration; a person who used both an opioid and xylazine may start breathing again but not fully regain consciousness. If a person is breathing again but remains sedated, place the person in a recovery position and await further help (paramedics). Do not administer more doses of naloxone once breathing has returned.







Are you a CalFresh recipient whose food spoiled due to the power outages?

You can request a replacement of your CalFresh Food benefits if your food spoiled due to a power outage. You have up to 10 days after the food was lost to request the replacement. Contact your local county office for help.

How do I request a replacement of my CalFresh Food benefits?

Contact your local county office. You will need to complete, sign, and turn in a 'CF 303' form to request a replacement. Include your contact information and a short description of how your food was lost. Include the time and date of the power outage.

Won't my local county office be closed because of the power outages?



When police contact a person suspected of committing a low-level offense, but who may display mental health or substance use struggles, they will be offered transport to the CARES center rather than jail. There, they meet with a peer support specialist and will be assessed by a clinician. La Familia Counseling Services is our partner for mental health and substance abuse while law enforcement from Oakland, San Leandro, Hayward and Fremont will be working with the program. CARES stands for "Community Assessment, Referral and Engagement Services." This program diverts individuals away from jail and the criminal justice system and into supportive services.

Free COVID Tests for Contra Costa Residents

Order Free COVID Test Kits from the County for the Holidays

Contra Costa residents can now get free at-home COVID test kits from Contra Costa Health (CCH) through a new mail-order program.

People can order up to 4 free at-home test kits per household by filling out **this online form [r20.rs6.net]** or by calling us at 833-829-2626. There are two tests in each kit. CCH will mail the kits directly to people's homes within approximately 5-7 business days. You must be a Contra Costa County resident to be eligible.

"We want these test kits to be a staple in people's medicine cabinets like aspirin or band-aids," said Dr. Sofe' Mekuria, deputy health officer for the County. "Testing gives people the information they need to make healthy choices and reduce the spread of COVID, especially during the winter holiday season when families and friends gather indoors."

Health officials strongly recommend people get tested if they feel sick or if they're planning to attend a large indoor gathering. Anyone who tests positive for COVID, even if they don't have symptoms, should isolate at home. See our **COVID-19 Patients & Contacts page [r20.rs6.net]** for more information about what to do if you test positive.

The County's mail-order program will run through the holidays and perhaps longer depending on our supply of at-home test kits.

The focus of the Collaborative is to implement a seven-strategy strategic plan, including:

- 1. Establish infrastructure to provide leadership, oversight, and accountability to the Strategic Plan
- 2. Develop a coordinated system of care to promote suicide prevention and wellness
- 3. Implement public campaigns to raise awareness about warning signs, promote available resources, and increase help-seeking

Testing and Test to Treat

COVID-19 Testing, and Test-to-Treat programs are widely available in San Mateo County. Schedules for County-sponsored vendors LHI/OptumServe and BayPLS are below. These services are available at no cost to you.

Test-to-Treat programs allow residents who test positive to be assessed for oral medications, and if they qualify, medication will be provided. LHI/OptumServe offers Test-to-Treat, allowing residents to take a rapid antigen test, stay onsite for results, and get medications (if eligible), all in one appointment.

Proof of vaccination

When you get the COVID-19 vaccine, we will ask for your cell phone number and email address. This information will make it easy to get a digital version of your vaccine record when you need it. A digital vaccine record makes it easy to prove your vaccine status if you lose your paper vaccine card.

You are not required to give us this information. But, if we don't have it, it may be hard get your digital vaccine record in the future. Any information you provide will be kept confidential and be part of your health record.

Samaritan House's Drive-Thru Pantry supplies food boxes full of groceries for low-income families who struggle to buy groceries. This option allows families to prepare fresh meals together at home. Bread is a basic food staple that Samaritan House provides Monday through Friday to all who are in need. A voucher system is now used to distribute bread from our Pantry. Bread Vouchers are obtained at Client Services with no application process and bread is available to anyone who is in need.

Dining Room

Samaritan House offers a take-out dinner (a hot meal and dessert) on weeknights, to any single adult or family that needs it. All are encouraged to take advantage of dining in a restaurant-style, community space in downtown San Mateo.

Mobile Meals

Recognizing that only able-bodied individuals were able to attend dinner at our Dining Hall, Samaritan House created a volunteer-based Mobile Meals program to deliver warm meals to the elderly and disabled. Please contact our Client Services department if you need Mobile Meal assistance.

Food Pharmacy

In an innovative collaboration with our partners at Second Harvest Food Bank, Samaritan House established Food Pharmacies at our two Free Healthcare Clinics in San Mateo and Redwood City. Our volunteer physicians write "prescriptions" for low-income patients who have diabetes. Then, the patients are able to fill those prescriptions on-site at our Food Pharmacies. Deepest thanks to Second Harvest Food Bank for keeping both pharmacies stocked with fresh produce and other healthy foods.
